



Dear St. James Family,

During our *Fall Stewardship Season 2025* we are **planning for our future** in many different ways. Together, we are considering what our congregation may look like in the year 2030 and beyond and we are taking steps <u>today</u> to prepare for that future. Part of our preparation for our future is to establish again a strong financial foundation for the work God is calling us to do.

This year, I invite you to take a few minutes to consider the word *tithe*. Do you know what it means? The word *tithe* comes from the same root as the word *tenth*. For the church it has always meant a portion of what God has given to us (usually 1/10 of our income) that we give back to God.

Recently, I was in a conversation with a friend about Fall Stewardship and the subject of a *tithe* came up. I mentioned that I was thinking about using that word as a core thought for our Fall Stewardship Season. He looked at me with an exasperated expression and said, "TEN PERCENT! DOES ANYONE STILL DO THAT ANY MORE?!?"

Many disciplines in the church that were commonplace just a generation ago have fallen by the wayside. Perhaps the *tithe* is one of them! Ten-percent might be aspirational for some of us who

are struggling to make ends meet, while ten-percent will be a baseline for others of us who have the means to share.

We are in difficult economic times. Inflation has gone up and wages are stagnant. As the prices of groceries and common household goods skyrockets, I understand firsthand the financial pressures facing all of us. But I also remind you: the work of the Church has persevered in every age. God is faithful and even in this difficult financial environment, the work of the Church will once again persevere.

Please prayerfully consider how you plan to support God's work through our church in the coming year.

Lastly, for your convenience we created an <u>online form</u> with all of the questions on the *Estimate of Giving* card and *Serving St. James* survey. The online form is identical to the paper versions you will receive in the coming week. Since we have two ways to submit your responses, please note: you only need to fill out one method or the other. A link to that form will be sent to the church email list on Monday, October 6th.

Thank you, again, for your faithfulness and dedication to the life of our church. I look forward to serving with you in the year to come!

Oct. 12th – Stakeholders Meeting

- > The meeting will take place immediately after the Sunday morning service in the Nave. All are welcome to participate.
- A Stakeholder is anyone who holds a "stake" in the health and future prosperity of our church. That is YOU! Join us!
- ➤ We will discuss our hopes, dreams, and aspirations for what our church may become over the next 3-5 years.

Oct. 19th - Open Church Council Meeting

- > The meeting will take place immediately after the Sunday morning service in the Nave. All are welcome to participate.
- ➤ The focus of this meeting is to discuss potential updates to our Church Constitution in advance of a vote at the 2026 Annual Meeting. We will attempt to consider the question: What adjustments to our Church Constitution do we need to enact to be a healthy, thriving congregation in 2030?
- > These proposed changes from Council may include:
 - Required updates from ELCA Churchwide Assembly in July 2025 and other recommendations from our Synod
 - Minor increase to the minimum requirements for church membership and participation on Church Council.
 - o Redaction of outdated language such as C9.03.A10
- Copies of the Church Constitution will be available in the Narthex for you to read and pray in advance of the meeting.

Oct. 25th & 26th - Reflection & Celebration

- A Temple Talk will be delivered by the Church Council during the Sunday service to review the work of the church during our Fall Stewardship Season
- > Celebrate with donuts and other goodies after the services!




St James GANG will meet on Thursday, October 16th, in the Fellowship Hall at 11:30.

A Modern-Day Parable

Say you follow the landowner's direction in Matthew 20:1-16: "Take what belongs to you and go"? What happens after you do just that?


In a story often attributed to the later Mother Teresa, she and other religious sisters we distributing food to an impoverished village. Each family was allowed to send one member with one bucket to be filled with dry grains of rice. To the surprise of a novice shadowing Mother Teresa, one elderly woman in the line held two buckets.

Greeting the woman by name, Mother Teresa proceeded to fill only one of the buckets. Thanking her, the woman walked a short distance away, and emptied half of her full bucket into the second empty one. Seeing this as a great inequity, the novice asked, "Why did we not fill up both buckets for that poor, elderly woman?"

Mother Teresa explained that there was only enough rice for one bucket per family each day. "Her neighbors are very ill," she said. "She is emptying half of her family's share into her neighbor's bucket to bring to them because she cannot carry more."

Overcome by sorrow, the novice wanted to fill the sick family's bucket and carry it for the woman. Mother Teresa stopped what she was doing and looked at the novice. "Never take away the right of another person to be generous," she said.
